Certificate of RNID online hearing check result

This patient has taken the RNID online hearing check. Their result indicates that they may have hearing loss.

Advice for GPs

Recommended investigation:

- otoscopy for outer and middle ear pathology
- · discussion of hearing difficulties
- the use of a tuning fork if available.

Depending on the outcome of the investigation, a referral for a full audiology assessment might be necessary in accordance with NICE guidelines for hearing loss (2018).

Evidence shows that the earlier someone receives support for hearing loss, the more likely they are to benefit long term. Hearing aids are the most common management option for hearing loss and are clinically proven to improve communication and reduce social isolation.

About the hearing check

The RNID hearing check is a 'speech-in-noise' check. It assesses the ability to hear someone speaking when there's background noise, as in a crowded room. So it checks hearing ability in a real-life way.

At the end of the check, the listener receives a result and advice on what to do next, along with this certificate.

The hearing check does not provide a medical diagnosis, but it can identify when someone may have hearing loss. It cannot determine the degree or type of hearing loss – for example, sensorineural or conductive.
