How our free Will service works

RNID is partnered with several external Will-making organisations to help you make or update your Will.

You can make or update your Will online, on the phone, by video or in person.

We are also partnered with accredited and insured British Sign Language (BSL) interpreters if you wish to make your Will using BSL.

However, we are unable to fund the use of your own BSL interpreter for insurance reasons and to avoid potential conflict of interest.

RNID funds two appointments – one to make and one to complete your Will.

If you choose to make your Will using BSL we will also fund the interpreter's attendance of the appointments.

Your free Will offer is valid for 12 months from the date you receive your free Will information.

There are a few different ways to make or update your Will for free – online, on the phone, by video and in person.

When you're ready to take the next step, we'll ask you some quick questions about yourself to help us suggest the best option for you.

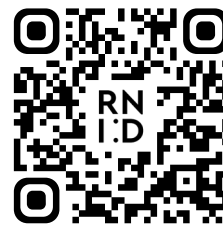
Leaving a gift in your Will to RNID

Get ready to make your Will

Making a Will can feel like a complex process, but it doesn't have to be. Here are **some simple steps** to help you get ready.



Make a list of what you own and any debts you have

Your estate is everything you own and could include your house, car, jewellery, or favourite records.

Note down the value of these items as well as any money you owe.



Decide who and what matters most to you

Think about how you'd like to provide for others in your Will, such as your family, friends, a neighbour, or your favourite charities.



Choose who will carry out your wishes

An executor is the person who ensures wishes in your Will are followed. It could be a friend, family member, or professional.



Consider how your dependents will be looked after

If you have children, people you care for, or pets, decide who you would like to take care of them.



Note down any questions or worries

Having these ready will help you get all the answers you need at your appointment.
